The education of 1.6 billion learners has been disrupted since the onset of the global COVID-19 pandemic, with over 300 million students still out of school today. Under-privileged learners have been disproportionately impacted as they tend to have fewer educational opportunities beyond school and their parents may be unable to facilitate learning at home.

Undeniably, the Covid-19 pandemic played a significant challenge for teachers. As of Friday 23rd March 2020, all schools, nurseries and colleges had to be shut down and many exams were cancelled in India. A major global event with unprecedented effects, this led to enormous pressure on teachers. Many had to adapt to new alternative ways of teaching and looking after their students. At home, parents had to become teachers, helping their children to learn while juggling with work and many other priorities.

Teachers are an icon of knowledge. They are one of the most influential forces for quality education and development. They are a source of awareness and enlightenment. They nourish their students with their wisdom. They teach the children real skills for a successful life (to children). This Teacher's Day is a golden opportunity to accolade them for their services.

In the present age of the early 21st-century, teaching is not an easy profession. Once upon a time, teachers were highly respected and valued and were role models for young people. Indeed, in societies that tend to glorify celebrities like artists, sportsmen more than outstanding teachers, there are, without doubt, considerable challenges to the status of teaching profession worldwide.

My experience as a teacher


My first experience of teaching was sitting under a tree near the canal close to Jeevadhara in Kuttikad. Most of the children were hungry and naked. I thought teaching was so boring. The time went very slow. Children were out of my control. They used to jump into the canal often during my class. Some looked happy, some were very sad, some were dreaming or sleeping. Many were looking for my care, attention and love. There were few who

were rebellious. Some had a tendency to lie always and not honest in their dealings. Some of them were very lazy and even did not want to open their mouth. I just waited for 12 O'clock to close up our 'open' school.

After a few days of teaching, I realized that ABCD and 123...

are not enough. They needed my care, love and attention. After two weeks, I began to give more and more care, love and attention to them. Less and less children began to jump into the canal. All of them began to sit around me and listen to me. They began to get attached to me. But unfortunately, I had to stop teaching after the 'graduation ceremony'. Just a few years ago a young man with two children came up to me asked, "Sister, do you remember me? You were teaching me under the tree". I certainly remembered him!

I started to teach in St. Joseph's Holy Family school, in Aloor. By the time, I was more experienced as a teacher. I was one with them. I gave each one of them so much love, care and attention. They all had high impression about me. I came into their



level. When they were playing "hide and seek", I too played with them. I got so much of appreciation and praise from their parents and the also from the sisters. It gave me so much energy and encouragement. I began to realize that teaching is not an easy job, but I have to put myself into it. Actually, teaching is a skill.

The instruction of our Blessed Marie Poussepin reminds me more and more the responsibilities of a good teacher. Marie Poussepin tells me that the teachers will apply themselves to make the children know, love and serve God. They should inspire the children to love virtues and make them understand the horror of vice. She insists on being

kind and tender-hearted to the children. She tells us to speak to them about God. I took some time daily to speak to them about Jesus.

After I got a professional training of International Montessori Training, I began to change my impressions as a teacher. The concentration of a teacher should not be more on the language, Science, Mathematics and Social Studies etc. but on the moral formation of the children. My aim should not be only to get good result but moulding the children to maturity, morality and good behaviour. I should listen to their communication. I need to be more kind, compassionate and patient, knowing their background. I need to be just and not partial in my dealings with them, whether they are rich or poor, smart or dull,



beautiful or ugly. I realized each one needs my attention and love.

As a teacher, I learned a lot from them, their simplicity, innocence, openness etc. I had to come into their level to get their love and attention. By the end of my teaching life, I won all my children's attention. There are many Doctors, Engineers, Businessmen, Policemen and drivers among my students. I hope and pray that God may bless them all with good life.

I taught in various schools. It all began under a tree as already mentioned. Then Kuttikad Church in LKG and UKG followed by St. Joseph's EMH School, Aloor. I was in Sacred Heart School in Chalakudy, before going to France in 1985. I taught skits, songs and speeches to the children. The Head Mistress used to ask me "Sr.

Jos Mary how do you manage so well with 68 children in the class?". In the beginning of the year, I had to use all my energy to make the children of 3 years of age to feel at home! Within one week they stop their crying.

When I returned from France, I taught in Khargone St. Jude School. I used to be very active during all the Annual Day preparations. I presented a yoga and drill program with almost 100 children. I did not have the drums and band set to practice. So, I used to beat on rusted bucket and the

children did very well. There teachers used to laugh at me seeing my rusted bucket. I also taught in St Mary's High school, Badhravathi. I really enjoyed teaching there. The Head Master and the Father director, really appreciated me.

Though I was assigned to Dhulkot school at two different occasions I taught there only for short time; my ill health did not allow me to continue. I had 3 years of teaching experience in Lake Montfort School, Bangalore. I was one of the pioneers there. Besides teaching I was very much involved in all kinds of cultural programs. Bro. Ignatius was very happy with me as a teacher. My next transfer was to our St Dominic's School in Karehalli. I enjoyed my teaching there too very much.

I also had the chance to teach in Loyola School, Raichur. I was the Co- Ordinator of KG section and class teacher for UKG class. By the end of the day, I was exhausted but still had



to give tuition to 40 children. I was also in charge of the teacher's hostel. It was not easy to manage everything. Fr. Terrance SJ, the director, was very good to me. He gave me a lot of support and expressed his appreciation. I was also sent to Soganur to teach. After few years of teaching in St. Xavior's Matriculation School, as my health was going down, I was transferred. As I was leaving Fr. Mathias, Mr. Joseph and Mr. Mathew told me "Sister, we are going to lose one of the best teachers!" I could not say good-bye to my children because of lockdown.

Wonderful Teacher My message to all the teachers for this Teachers' Day is... to prepare your lessons well, come down to the level of children, learn a lot of things from the students, don't have the superior attitude towards the children and never be partial to them. Know that the children are very sensitive, they observe all that we do, be honest to them, encourage them in their weakness and place confidence in them when they are discouraged, talk to them about Jesus in all occasions, impart knowledge and wisdom to them because they are tomorrow's responsible citizens. They will be the ones who will hold the future of the country. So, love them as your own.

(1)Knowledge- Quality of education totally depends on the teachers, their knowledge, their relation with the students and their dedication and commitment to their profession. They enrich the students not only with subject knowledge but also all other things that is required for their growth. Try to be one among them and find out their strength and weakness. Treat everyone equally without making any distinction. We are partners of God in the classroom.

(2)Skills-Teacher usually have the skill of communication. Have the art of putting ideas effectively and clearly. Teaching is a unique combination of art, science and skill- as well as natural talent which involves planning to develop pupil's knowledge, understanding skills, assessing them effectively, motivating and having high expectations of them. Ample opportunities are given to the students to develop skills and have confidence to demonstrate their theoretical knowledge.

(3)A healthy attitude towards students- Some teachers are born by chance, but others by passion. Those born by chance can acquire the skills and attitudes needed to be efficient teachers. Students are the important persons in the campus.

They deserve our respect, love and teachers give them their best. But it does not mean we should pamper the students. Learn to be firm, and teach them to be disciplined persons.

(iv) Learning to live together: - Being the part of the team. Ability to recognize the dignity of other, and start with a desire to treat people fairly, honestly and considerably. You must be sincere and have to have the attitude of give and take. Teacher's role is not limited to educator; she/he is a guide, philosopher, motivator, friend and the same time, a moral preacher and role model. The teachers who are listened to are the ones who connect themselves to their students, their students to each other, and everyone to the subject being taught.

Our country needs individuals who can think and dream big, those who believe in their wildest dreams and set out to pursue them. Teachers have the potential to create ripples in their lives that reach far and wide, indelible by time. They can offer their ability to teach and inspire billions of children, so as to add colors and sparks into their lives, and promote their healthy growth and development.

A Good Teacher is:-

ONE-Good teaching is as much about passion as it is about reason. It's about not only motivating students to learn, but teaching them how to learn, and doing so in a manner that is relevant, meaningful, and memorable. TWO-Good teaching is about substance and treating students as consumers of knowledge. It's about doing your best to be on top of your field, reading sources inside and outside of your areas of expertise, and being at

the leading edge as often as possible. But knowledge is not confined to scholarly journals. Good teaching is also about bridging the gap between theory and practice.

THREE- Good teaching is about listening, questioning, being responsive, and remembering that each student and each class is different. It's about eliciting responses and developing the oral communication skills of the quiet students.

FOUR-Good teaching is about not always having a fixed agenda and being rigid, but being flexible, fluid, experimenting, and having the confidence to react and adjust to changing circumstances. It's about getting only 10 percent of what you wanted to do in a class done and still feeling good.

FIVE-Good teaching is also about style. Should good teaching be entertaining? You bet! Does this mean that it



lacks in substance? Not a chance! Effective teaching is not about being locked drone on. Good teachers work the room and every student in it.

SIX-Good teaching is about humor. It's about being self-deprecating and not taking yourself too seriously. It's often about making innocuous jokes, mostly at your own expense, so that the ice breaks and students learn in a more relaxed atmosphere where you are. Be human, with your own share of faults and shortcoming.

SEVEN- Good teaching is supported by strong and visionary leadership, and very tangible institutional support- resources, personnel, and funds.

EIGHT-Good teaching is about mentoring between senior and junior faculty, teamwork, and being recognized and promoted by one's peers. Effective teaching should also be rewarded, and poor teaching needs to be remediated through



training and development programs.

NINE-At the end of the day, good teaching is about having fun, experiencing pleasure and intrinsic rewards... like locking eyes with a student in the back row and seeing the synapses and neurons connecting, thoughts being formed, the person becoming better, and a smile cracking across a face as learning all of a sudden happens.

TEN-Time is one of the most precious resources a teacher has. Good teachers have learned to use this resource wisely.

Lk 18:27 says "What is impossible for human beings is possible for God". The lockdown followed by the online classes blew up my brain. I, being in charge of Ashirvad School, was very much concerned about my students' further education as our students are from interior villages where no mobile companies till date is able to connect them with the rest of the world. Like any other responsible person, I felt the pain in my heart and my only source of consolation at these difficult moments were to take them to the Lord through Blessed Virgin Mary, who, I believe, told her Son, "They have no wine...." They have no mobile phones....no money to buy them and even if they buy there is no range.

Conducting online classes in rural areas is a big challenge because of the digital divide. The Covid – 19 pandemic has presented difficult challenges for school managements. Schools that are particularly located in rural areas are facing problems both in terms in financial impact as well as digital divide. Then the miracle started to happen in front of my eyes.

First Miracle: The first step that we took was to make our staff understand the gravity of the crisis that we are going through and gave them a clear picture of our school finances. I am grateful that our teaching staff pledged to cooperate with us. In the initial days of lockdown, the government had passed the order, no school, no fees collection which meant that parents who had the income to pay also could refuse, which has now been reversed. The state government still owes RTE reimbursements (Right to Education Act 2009) which has been a major source of relief to us during this time. We have received the money of academic year 2018-19, this year.

Second Miracle: Creation of class wise WhatsApp groups: Conducting online classes in rural area has its own challenge and many students who do not have access to smart phones or internet service are left out in the process. We are offering online classes to the students who have got whatsapp and created a class wise WhatsApp group and send the study materials what the government is sending us. We also requested the children who had the WhatsApp groups to share the study material with



the students who had no smart phones but are from their villages. In this manner we were able to reach out to more students. Conducting online classes in rural areas is a big challenge because most of the parents are illiterate and lack any technical knowledge. In cities the educated parents assist their children to study whereas our children do not have that privilege yet Is: 54:-3 takes flesh in their lives "All your children shall be taught by the Lord and great shall be the prosperity of your children".

Third Miracle: Illiterate parents are a big challenge in rural areas. We have been helping the parents to get ready with the documents to do the RTE online for the academic year 2021-22. There are almost 100 parents have done the online, and we humbly acknowledge that all have given priority for our school, but our school can cater to only 25 seats. We have taken online admission for 25 RTE students. It was a great challenge for us to single out these 25 students for admission. Many do not know how to look for the messages, many lost their mobiles and the sim cards after the online enrollment. But we have helped them in all their difficulties in getting admission in the school. Neh2: 20 say"

The God of heaven will make us prosper".

Fourth Miracle: We have submitted the RTE proposal on June 30th for the fee reimbursements of the academicals year 2019-20. We will be getting the fees soon. Is 45:3 says

"I will give you the treasure of darkness and the richness hidden in secret places. I have experienced blessings after blessings in the mission of Dhulkot. God is very much active and alive in the mission taking the side of the poor by being true to His promises.



Sr. Patricia: I hope I have not hurt your feelings! I am not claiming to be the sole lover and possessor of the charism of our Congregation. Are we to close down this ministry! You must be kidding!

Sr. Margret: How can you say that?

Sr. Patricia: God's power is seen in our weaknesses, so says St. Paul. I think if we abandon ourselves to His care, He will help us to be his effective instruments in this ministry.

Marie Poussepin: Sr. Noel, Sr. Noel... (Sr. Noel looks

Sr. Noel: Who is there?

Marie Poussepin: It is me, Marie Poussepin.

Sr. Noel: Mother, you are here!

Marie Poussepin: What happened to you? Why are you very sad, worried and upset?

Sr. Noel: Mother, it is too much mother!

Marie Poussepin: What is too much my daughter?

Sr. Noel: Mother, You know, the situation...I am illiterate in technology. I don't know how to organize the online classes. I know very little to handle the communication technology. Now that the government is asking to conduct online classes I feel terrible.

Sr. Noel: Our sisters and teachers are telling that they don't know how to handle the situation. They don't have mobiles..... Internet, expertise etc. You know mother, most of the students come from humble financial backgrounds with neither mobile nor internet. I am going crazy.... Marie Poussepin: My dear relax.....Do you think the whole pandemic situation was unknown to God.

Sr. Noel: No mother! So what?

Marie Poussepin: If it was known to God, He will have a solution to it. Did you consult Him about it?

Sr. Noel: We all are frantically searching for a solution.

Marie Poussepin: My dear, my question is did you consult Him.

Sr. Noel: Mother you know that we all are frantically looking for a solution.

Marie Poussepin: I understand dear what you are going through. Tell me, did you talked about this to the Lord.

Sr. Noel: Frankly speaking, Mother, I was so panic that I forgot to take it before Him. As usual I was just looking into my own inabilities and incapacities of my team members.

3. The Changing Role of a Teacher.







No body can ever deny the fact that 'we are great history' and living through it because of the global virus pandemic. It continues to pose significant challenges and the greatest risk of global catastrophe haunting, the long-term livelihoods and wellbeing of millions in all walks of life, when compared to other threats of humanity.

The COVID-19 pandemic has led to a dramatic loss of human life worldwide and presents an unprecedented dispute to public health, food, education, economic, political social spiritual and emotional disruption, global security, disease outbreaks and the world of work. Pandemic influenza has caused devastation to human lives and livelihoods as much asany world war. To become the digital teachers, teachers are facing many challenges. To get plunged into the sea of online classes, teachers are tryingto become online experts to impart the knowledge at this time of pandemic.

Many teachers have expressed that the onlineclasses often have left them clueless about their teaching as students tend to switch off their cameras during class. Every parent wants their children to be happy and to do well for themselves. So when the opportunities are given parents jump at the chance to make their kid's life easier. This is an instinctual behavior, but some parents take "being supportive" to another level and hover over their children like a helicopter.

It is the opposite of free- ange parenting; where independence and thinking for oneself are encouraged but closely related to lawnmower par-

enting where a parent "mows down"; so to speak any problem a child might face so they never feel hurt, pain or disappointed.

While helicopter parenting has become widely discussed in recent

years, it is by no means a new term. The metaphor was actually first used in a 1969 in a book titled "Between Parents and Teenager" written by Dr. Haim Ginott.

Helicopter parenting refers to "a style of parents who are overly focused on their children." They typically take very much responsibility for their children's experiences and specifically, their successes or failures. Helicopter parenting is simply "over-parenting." It means, being involved in a child's life in a way that is overcontrolling, over-protecting, and overperfecting, in a way that is in excess of responsible parenting.

Many helicopter parents start off with good intention. It is a tricky line to find, to be engaged with children and their lives but not so meshed that we lose perspective on what they need.

Engaged parenting has many benefits for a child, such as feelings of love and acceptance, better self-confidence and opportunities to grow. However the problem is that once parenting becomes

governed by fear and decisions based on what might happen, it is hard to keep in mind all the things kids learn when we are not guiding each step. Failure and challenges teach kids new skills and most importantly, teach kids that they can handle failure and challenges and the ability to be resilient.

The helicopter parenting effects are widespread but may include these factors like:-

Decreased confidence and self-esteem: The main prob-

lem with helicopter parenting is that it backfires. Dr. Dunnewold says, "My parents doesn't trust me to do things my own." The over involvement of parents in kids' life doesn't allow them to grow. This in turn leads to a lack of confidence.

Undeveloped coping skills:
If the parent is always there

to clean up a child's mess or prevent the problem in the first place, how does the child ever learn to cope with loss, disappointments or failure? Studies have found that helicopter parenting can make children feel less competent in dealing with the stresses of life on their own.

Increased anxiety: A study from the University of Mary Washington has shown that over parenting is associated with higher levels of child anxiety and depression.

Sense of entitlement: Children who have always had their social, academic and athletic lives adjusted by their parents can become accustomed to always having their way and thus they develop a sense of entitlement. Underdeveloped life skills: Parents who always tie shoes, clear plates, pack lunches, launder clothes and monitor school progress even after children are mentally and physically capable of doing the task; prevent them from mastering these skills themselves.

Actually research suggests that parents who are heavily involved in the lives of their children enjoy

greater happiness and meaning in their lives. Yet the benefit of helicopter parenting might not extend to children. While some parents hover to give their children an advantage, the research suggests that constant involvement may cause some children to have a harder time in school and beyond.


As parents, they have a very difficult job. They need to keep one eye on their children's stress, strengths, and emotions and one eye on the adults they are trying to

As Dr. Gilboa says, "Remembering to look for opportunities to take one step back from solving the child's problems will help us build the resilient and self–confident kids we need."



Pope Francis to teachers:
Help students to be open to
others in a 'culture of
encounter.'



A lifestyle that is environmentally ethical cannot be "schizophrenic" -- for example, by showing more care for animals and forests, than for the plight of people, Pope Francis said.

A green lifestyle must be consistent and complete, driven by a love for God the creator and all of his creation, the pope said in a speech.

This approach demands teaching the importance of personal responsibility, not bombarding the children with slogans or catchy commands that someone else will have to carry out, he said. The pope also encouraged teachers and schools to rebuild a new alliance with families that mutually supports and strengthens each other.

Pope Francis also urged the Catholic teachers to continue to be inspired by their Christian values, whether they teach in public or private Catholic schools, and to encourage their students to be open to others in a "culture of encounter."

They need to be "capable of caring and tenderness -- I am thinking of bullying here -- free from widespread fallacies" that claim the only way to be worth anything is "to be competitive, aggressive and tough toward others, especially toward those who are different, foreign or seen as being an obstacle in some way to one's personal success," he said.

"Unfortunately, this is the 'air' our children often breathe," he said. The remedy is to give them a "change of air" that is healthier and more humane, he said, Help kids see others as brothers and sisters to be respected and as worthwhile in getting to know "with their past, their virtues and defects, assets and limits," he said.
